



Dr. V Kalaiselvan, Principal Scientific Officer, IPC gave the opening remarks. Dr. Shatrunajay Shukla, Scientific Assistant, IPC sensitized the audience about "Materiovigilance Programme of India". Miss. Amrutha, Scientist C, Sree Chitra Tirunal Institute for Medical Sciences and Technology (SCTIMST)sensitized the audience about "Causality Assessment: Medical Device & IVDs". The e-CME was attended by around 90 delegates from Government Medical Colleges across India including Jammu & Kashmir. Dr Jai Prakash, Secretary-cum-scientific Director, IPC gave the concluding remarks.


#### **Medical Device Updates**


ARS-COV-2 virus outbreak leads to rapid growth in demand and supply of PPEs in the country & abroad. In order to keep up growing demand, several Indian companies started manufacturing PPE Kits. It has been observed that many manufacturers are not complying with the Government guidelines & PPEs are being sold & being distributed in the market without proper testing & non-complying with the requried standards. To facilitate boost in adverse event reporting associated with PPEs,NCC-MvPI has developed one page electronically fillable adverse event reporting form specifically for PPEs. In response, Medical Device Adverse Event Monitoring Centres (MDMCs) and Adverse Drug Reaction Monitoring Centres (AMCs) are actively participating in reporting of adverse events associated with PPEs. NCC-MvPI observed that in 64% of the reported PPEs, the essential information including lot number/batch number, unique certification code (UCC), test standards, manufacturing date, expiry date were not mentioned. Which indicates that in most of the PPEs manufacturing, the quality norms are not being followed as per Government of India (GoI) guidelines.

Highest number of reported adverse events (43%) were associated with coveralls causing excessive sweating issue, dehydration, tearing of fabric material and skin allergies.

In 58% of total reports, PPEs were manufactured indigenously. Whereas in 28% reports the name of manufacturer were not mentioned on the PPE kit. 10% PPE devices were manufactured in China and 2% PPEs were manufactured in United states of America and 2% from Malaysia.

It was also observed that 84% of the adverse events occurred within the healthcare facility (including 37% in the in-patient service, 11% in the emergency department and 36% in the other department of the hospital). 2% of all the events occurred during home quarantine, whereas in 14% of the reports the location of event was not mentioned.


